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Dear Webelos Scout Parents and Leaders;

Greetings from the Winnebago Camp Staff. We look forward to welcoming you to Winnebago Scout Reservation this summer. We are very proud of our camp and happy that you have chosen to experience Webelos Resident Camp. The adult leaders, combined with our outstanding staff, dynamic program, and beautiful outdoor surroundings will offer everyone an awesome experience.

The booklet is intended to assist you in preparing your unit for four fun-filled and exciting days at Webelos Scout Resident Camp. It is important that you take the time to read this manual, and share it with your adult leaders.

### **Camp Leadership**

**The person in charge of your Pack/Den must be at least 21 years of age.** There are no exceptions. In addition, it is the policy of the Boy Scouts of America that outings may never be led by only one adult. At least two registered adult leaders, one of whom must be 21 years of age or older and is certified in youth protection, are required for all outings. The result is more fun and less stress for the leaders, and a better program for the boys. Preferably, the pack should have at least one den leader for each den it brings to camp. The Den Leader will participate in Leader's meetings, and work with the Pack adult leadership to assign responsibilities for adult leadership.

#### **YOUR SCOUT CAN ATTEND CAMP WITH HIS:**

**Pack: Requires two adults per 8 Scouts. Or with his**

**Den: Requires two adults per 8 Scouts. Or alone**

**As an Individual: Requires Parent attendance. Or alone**

**As an Individual with Patriots' Path Council providing leadership.**

A Pack coming with more than 8 Scouts requires one adult for each additional 8 Scouts. You may alternate days with other parents in order to obtain the coverage.

**This program DOES NOT include siblings.**

We ask you to bring any costumes, activities, and skits relating to our theme. Feel free to contact us with any questions or concerns prior to camp. We can't wait to see you this summer!!!

## **E-Z Check-In/Orientation:**

How would you like to make check-in more efficient? Less time waiting at the Health Lodge for the Health Officer to check medical forms? More time to settle into your campsite? If this sounds good to you, then please come to the Health Lodge on June 20<sup>th</sup> between NOON and 4:00 PM or the Camp Office on July 27<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 PM to hand in paperwork, ask questions, enjoy snacks and get a taste of the fun that your Scouts will enjoy during their week at camp. This meeting will allow the Staff to be more prepared to meet the specific needs of your Webelos, starting the moment you arrive at camp.

**You will be fast tracked when you check-in if you meet ALL the requirements for E-Z Check-In!!**

## **Webelos Camper Arrival:**

Webelos Scouts check-in **PROMPTLY AT 1:00 P.M. for Session 1, for Session 2 anytime after 9:00AM** in the parking lot. Please arrive with swimsuits on. Have Scouts bring a small bag with towel, t-shirt, socks so they can dry off after swim test. Parents should have the Scout's paperwork ready, including medical records (complete with parent and doctor's signatures), Medication Record/Physician Information form and Photo Release form any other documentation which has been forwarded to you from the Council Office to submit upon check-in. Staff will be in the Parking Lot to greet your Scout. **At check-in on Sunday or Friday all gear will be transported from the parking lot directly to the site by camp vehicle.** There will be a Site Guide assigned to ease your Scout through the check-in process. Medical records will be turned over to the Health Officer, along with any required medications, at check-in. This shortens the wait time at the Health Lodge. **Your Scout may not enter camp if Medical forms are not entirely complete. NO BLANK SPACES!**

**The first "in camp" meal for session 1 is Sunday dinner.**

**The first "in camp" meal for session 2 is Friday lunch.**

## **Scouting's Purpose and the Outdoor Program**

Outdoor activity is the most appealing feature of the Scouting Program. Boys are drawn to it because it offers opportunities for fun in hiking, camping, swimming, boating, canoeing and other outdoor activities

Underlying the appeal of fun and adventure in the outdoors are the serious purposes of Scouting. Outdoor activities provide a vehicle for the achievement of Scouting's primary goals.

Scouting's outdoor program is tailored to meet the needs and desires of youth and their families. Activities are planned to match the desires and abilities of their age level. For Webelos Scouts, learning through doing, experimenting, and exploring are essential parts of the Scouting program. These are done through the Pack he joins, and the Den he is part of.

The simple skills essential to living in a primitive setting are inherent in the Scouting program. The boy learns to respect and conserve the blessings of God in his natural surroundings. When disaster strikes, he can cope with it. He uses his head, heart and hands when he provides for himself and others in the outdoors. Learning and using these skills in his den and Pack is a part of his adventure in Scouting as he progresses through the ranks.

This guide has been prepared so that you and your Webelos will get the most from his summer at Winnebago Scout Reservation. Please take some time to look through this book as it will provide you both with an in-depth understanding of camp.



## **PLANNING YOUR SUMMER CAMP ADVENTURE**

Planning for summer camp should start several months before you plan to arrive at camp. As a Parent, it is your responsibility to ensure your Scouts are prepared to set and accomplish their personal goals. Here are a few basic tips to help you ensure this happens. You should take a few minutes at a Pack meeting to talk with each Scout about the summer camp agenda and provide guidance on individual preparation. Some Packs find it helpful to hold a “Summer Camp Meeting” just prior to camp to go over what Scouts need to bring with them for the camp session. At this meeting you should also hand out information packets to parents, finalize paperwork, secure the needed equipment for the Pack campsite, and review the program schedule. Most of all, remember that summer camp is an opportunity for Scouts to grow both mentally and physically.

## **GETTING BOYS EXCITED ABOUT CAMP!!!**

This can be accomplished in many ways. Several ideas for promotion include:

- Take your Scouts to Winnebago during the year, and let them explore. Discuss the different program areas and historical sites around camp.
- Hold Pack fund raising projects to help Scouts earn part of their own camp fees.
- Show slides or videos of previous summer camps at Pack meetings.
- Invite former and current staff members to visit your Pack to talk about camp to heighten the Scout’s interest. We are happy to do it!
- While on a Pack campout, have a campfire and share songs, stories and skits from previous summer camp experiences.

## **INFORMING PARENTS ABOUT CAMP**

Successful Packs hold an informational meeting for parents before camp. This meeting can be held in conjunction with a Pack meeting, or at some other convenient time prior to summer camp. Parents need to be informed about all of the details regarding summer camp. Items such as camp rules, equipment needs, and departure and arrival times should all be covered during this meeting. All of the needed information for a pre-camp meeting can be found in this Webelos Parent/Leader’s Guide.

## **REFUND POLICY**

Patriots' Path Council reserves the right to cancel programs and/or bus stops, as attendance requires. If the Council cancels a program, the payment can be transferred to another camping program or returned as requested.

**The following refund policies are in place for customer cancellations:**

**NON-MEDICAL:** THE REQUEST MUST BE IN WRITING, IF CANCELLED 30 DAYS PRIOR TO CAMP, A REFUND OF FEES PAID, MINUS A 15% ADMINISTRATIVE FEE BASED ON THE TOTAL DUE, WILL BE ISSUED. ***NO REFUNDS WILL BE MADE WITHIN 30 DAYS OF CAMP DATE.***

**MEDICAL:** THE REQUEST MUST BE IN WRITING **AND** INCLUDE A DOCTOR'S NOTE.

## **REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS**

The Patriot's Path Council, Boy Scouts of America, provides program, facilities, and services without regard to race, color, national origin, age, gender, or handicap. However, all leaders, and youth on the reservation must be **current registered members** of the Boy Scouts of America. Also, no camper, youth or adult will be permitted to stay in camp unless their full camp fees have been paid prior to the start of their camp session.

## **MEDICAL FORMS**

All Webelos Scouts and Leaders going to camp must, upon arrival, present a completed Annual Health and Medical Record. This must be updated annually. Be sure to keep the original for your records and make a copy for camp.

## **MEDICATION DISPENSING POLICY:**

Each Webelos Scout **MUST HAVE** a Annual Health and Medical Record on file at Camp to participate.

The BSA routine drug administration record will be completely filled out by the Health Officer.

Each Webelos Scout will be observed to ensure the medication is being taken.

If a Webelos Scout refuses to take medication, the Reservation Director or Health Officer will notify the parents immediately.

## **SPECIAL NEEDS**

Any Scout or Leader with special needs must inform the camp staff prior to their arrival. Be sure to inform Camping Services of the type of need, i.e. physical, medical, dietary, food allergies, etc. Special requests and needs should be turned in as soon as possible so the camp staff can work with you.

**Clothing should be clearly marked with your full name and Pack number.**

**DO NOT BRING:**

**PERSONAL BOWS, ARROWS, B.B. GUNS, BOATS ARE NOT PERMITTED IN CAMP.**

## **LOST AND FOUND POLICY:**

Patriots' Path Camps will hold items in camp while it is in session, with the exception of food/perishables, which will be destroyed immediately. Articles may be retrieved by claiming the item in person at the applicable camp during the camping season. After camp is over, the items will be dispensed in an appropriate manner. Patriots' Path Council is NOT responsible for anything left or forgotten at camp.

## **SPENDING MONEY:**

It is suggested that Scouts bring spending money to camp. Packs may wish to operate a "bank" to hold money for Scouts while at camp. Only small bills 1s, 5s & 10s should be brought to camp, as the Trading Post cannot easily make change for larger bills.

All personal items and spending money should be kept in a secure camp box while at camp.

## Insurance

The Council Health and Accident Insurance Policy currently in effect covers all currently registered Patriots' Path Council Scouts and Scouters for all camp activities at the time of camp. **All out-of-council Scouts attending our camps must provide proof of unit health and accident insurance prior to arrival at camp. Out-of-Council Scouts must file Incident Report(s) directly to their Council.**

### Coverage Limits

Accident Medical Expense*	\$15,000
Illness Expense*	\$ 7,500

This coverage is secondary to a participant's personal Health insurance with a reimbursement of up to \$300.00 of out of pocket expense.

\* If there is no other valid and collectible insurance available from any other source, this coverage may pay the covered expenses up to the amount of benefit shown above. A notarized statement will be required.

### **Youth Protection Guidelines**

Our nation's greatest asset is its youth, and Scouting is pledged to protecting and nurturing our children. Therefore, consistent with Youth Protection Guidelines, adults must not stay in tents or showers with youth members. Those people not following these policies will be asked to leave camp. The only exception to these policies is the right of the parent to share a tent with their own child. Although allowed, it is recommended that parents do not exercise this right at camp, if the Scout has a friend that he would like to share a tent with. Doing so helps to ensure that their son receives the maximum benefit possible from his camp experience, begins his experience tenting with other boys.

Youth protection is offered by the Commissioner Staff, and it is recommended that all adults take it. Please let us know if you are interested in taking this course at WSR.

### **Leader's Meeting**

There will be a Leader's Meeting on Sunday and Friday evening. **All available leaders should attend.** In addition, the Reservation Director and Program Director will always be available to talk to you about any questions or concerns.

## **Wristbands:**

All Scouts, leaders and guests must wear camp wristbands at all times. One is provided to each person upon check-in. Each additional wristband will cost \$.50.

## **Visitors:**

Four days of camp goes by very quickly due to the myriad of projects and activities with which a boy gets involved. For this reason, the boy has little time for much else. Certainly, parents and friends are interested in what he is doing, and he is encouraged to send postcards and letters telling of his experiences. Winnebago Scout Reservation does not offer a specific Visitors Night. Your Scout is in program from 9 to 12, 2 to 5, and 7 to 9 – a very busy and rewarding experience.

Check with the Reservation Director for visitation procedures.

**Note: All visitors must follow signs and check in at the Camp Office and receive wristbands. All visitors must wear camp wristbands at all times. All visitors must pay at Camp Office for any meals they will be sharing with their Scout (\$6.00 for breakfast, \$7.00 for lunch, and \$8.00 for dinner). Use meal receipt for presentation to Steward at Dining Hall.**

## **Emergency Calls:**

In case of an emergency, the Winnebago Scout Reservation telephone number is 973-983-9075. A message will be taken and delivered to the individual concerned as quickly as possible. ***Do not expect to talk to the person immediately.***

## **Mailing Address:**

The Webelos love to get mail while they are in camp. They like to know their families are thinking of them while they are away. For anyone who wishes to send mail to camp (before posting mail, please consider that the Scout will be in camp for a short duration and mail service generally takes two days to arrive at camp) the mail can be addressed as follows:

Inside the Camp Office there is a mailbox for each campsite. Scouts and leaders who receive mail will have the items placed in their respective mailboxes when it arrives. Please check your mailbox daily for mail and/or messages.

## **Emergency Horn:**

1. General emergency: Two blasts, pause, two blasts, pause, two blasts.
2. Lost bather emergency: Three blasts, pause, three blasts, pause, three blasts.
3. A single long blast signals all clear (This will only happen after you hear either general emergency signal or Lost bather signal and the emergency is resolved prior to everyone arriving at dining hall)

Emergency drill will be held Monday and Thursday just prior to lunch.

## **Buddy System:**

Always in force at the waterfront, the Buddy System **MUST be used by all scouts at all times.** This means that any time a Scout is going anywhere, he **MUST** have a buddy with him. Remember – safety first!

## **Colors and Retreat**

Morning colors will be at the parade field at 7:50 am. From there we will proceed to the dining hall for breakfast.

Evening retreat will be at 5:45pm, and all in camp will assemble at the parade field. The field uniform is appropriate for all Webelos and adults. All will be dismissed from retreat to dinner.

### **Trading Post:**

The Trading Post operates as a service to the camp community. Items that can be found in the Trading Post include handicraft kits, official BSA uniform parts, snacks, soft drinks, ice cream, stamps, and other Scouting literature, T-shirts, souvenirs, and various items from the BSA Supply Catalog. The hours of operation will be posted on the Trading Post.

### **Camp Pictures:**

A great souvenir of a fabulous fun week in camp is a camp site, Den or Pack photograph. There will be a professional photographer in camp after dinner on Sunday and Wednesday to take a picture of you. The cost is \$8.00 per photograph – in cash. Please bring any Den/Pack flags or other items you wish to be in your photograph with you on picture night.

### **Uniforms:**

The Webelos Scout official uniform (blue shorts, blue shirt, and neckerchief for all, or green shorts and khaki shirt with neckerchief for Webelos) is required for retreat and dinner each evening.

On Monday and Saturday evening, after dinner, costumes appropriate to the theme may be worn to activities.

During the day, Webelos Scout/Scout t-shirts and shorts or pants may be worn to all activities. T-Shirts, with no other writing, are also appropriate.

Sneakers or shoes (NOT SANDALS) must be worn at all times. An experience at camp with sore feet is not a positive experience.

To make the orientation easier, please have your Webelos wear their bathing suit under their clothes upon arrival at camp. This will make it faster to get swim checks done during the orientation.

# Winnebago Webelos Program

During your stay at Webelos Resident Camp, you and your Webelos can have fun at our BB gun range, Archery range, Waterfront (Swimming, Boating and Fishing), Handicraft lodge, Ecology area, Sports field, going on hikes and more.

You may also work on the following Activity Badges: Aquanaut; Archery; Artist; Athlete; BB Gun; Craftsman; Forester; Geologist; Handyman; Naturalist; Outdoorsman; Readyman and Sportsman. All Activity Badges may not be offered—dependent on number of sign-ups. In addition, the Webelos Scout resident camp program has been designed to capture the interest of 9 and 10 year old boys. The program goals are to give each Webelos Scout an opportunity to start working on activity badges, to learn more about the world we live in, and to develop a greater appreciation for the outdoors. As far as the boys are concerned, the biggest goal of Scouting is to have fun, and through that they will meet the other goals.

Please remember that the parent signs off on these badges based on requirements listed for the badges. The camp will provide opportunities to do the skills required for the badges.

Going to camp is probably the greatest experience that your Webelos Scout will have in the normal Scout year. The camp program and the scheduling is the responsibility of the Program Director and Staff. The primary responsibility of every staff member is to see that each Webelos Scout stays safe while having a fun time at camp. The staff is well trained and eager to help the program succeed. Do not hesitate to see the Reservation Director or Program Director with any questions, concerns, or comments. It's how we learn to improve the Webelos Resident Camp experience.

## ***Program Philosophy***

**The Webelos Scout program exists for the Webelos Scouts to gain experience and exposure in many outdoor activities. This will prepare them for future adventures in the Boy Scout camping program.**

Your Pack/Den/Scout will be able to participate in all the program areas being offered. With its adult leadership, Scouts will be able to design their own activity schedule based on the areas of camp in which they most want to participate or badges they want to earn.

### **Archery**

Instruction in safety, and then shooting, with a bow and arrow.

### **BB Range**

Safety instruction, then marksmanship practice with target shooting.

## **Sports**

Try out the various activities held on the sports field, or talk to the Field Sports instructor to try out other activities.

## **Handicraft**

We will work on handicraft oriented projects and various activities for Webelos achievement awards.

## **Nature**

The Nature Area offers the Scouts outdoors experiences to learn more about the camp world around us. Visiting the nature area will be fun, exciting, and give you the chance to work on achievements and try out your fishing and hiking skills.

## **Outdoor Skills**

Learn and use basic Scout skills. Be part of the competitions, try new things, and be prepared to have fun.

## **At The Lake**

During orientation, you will be given the opportunity to take a swim test. Everyone will be classified as Swimmer, Beginner, or Non-swimmer.

If your Webelos are interested in working on Aquanaut, please sign up during Swimming orientation for a schedule of the activity requirements.

Safe Swim Defense and Safety Afloat will be offered for all adult leaders.

**Swimming**--For those hot summer days, spend some time with free swim in our gorgeous Durham Pond. ***TRY THE WATER TRAMPOLINE – ROLLING LOG***

**Boating**--Begins with basic safety and boating instruction. All campers are welcome to come down and try row boating and paddle boating. Webelos and adults who are Swimmers are able to try canoeing.

**Miss Winnie** – Fishing trip 6:00 AM to 7:30 AM and 7:00 PM to 8:30 PM.

### **Campfire**

On Sunday/Friday evening, an opening campfire will be presented by the staff.

On Tuesday/Saturday night, the closing campfire will be coordinated by the Program Director, but will be conducted by the Scouts.
